

On November 23, 2017, Dr. Danielle Hunt (G '15) Assistant Professor in the Department of Interpretation and Translation gave a research presentation titled "Power and Ideology in Interpreter-Mediated Contexts: Researching ASL-English Interpreters' Identity from Sociolinguistic and Phenomenological Perspectives" at the LARIM2 Conference in Rome, Italy. LARIM (*Laboratorio di Ricerca sulle Interazioni Mediate dall'Interprete*) is a research group on interpreter-mediated interactions within the Faculty of Interpreting and Translation at the University in Rome. The focus of the research group is to promote descriptive studies based on fieldwork and authentic empirical data, with a scientifically sound theoretical and methodological basis. The research conducted by Dr. Hunt and Dr. Melanie Metzger, also from DOIT, focuses on who interpreters say they are and how this identity appears in an interpreted interaction.
